LEUTE (People)

Most words referring to people take masculine or feminine gender based on the person's biological gender. Very few 'people' nouns take neuter gender. (See below.)

People nouns are often based on words (such as verbs) by adding '-er' to the end of the stem of the word. This results in nouns meaning 'the one who performs or is engaged in that activity'. Nouns based on the '-er' pattern are very consistent in the following grammar points:

• The plural form is identical to the masculine singular form.

- (der Amerikaner, die Amerikaner = the American man, the American people)
- The feminine counterpart is created by adding '-in' (after '-er') to the end of the word. (die Amerikanerin = the American woman; die Tänzerin = the female dancer)
- The plural feminine is formed by adding '-nen' to the end of the noun. (die Amerikanerinnen = the American women; die Tänzerinnen = the female dancers)
- There is no distinct form indicating male-only plural.

(die Amerikaner = the Americans; This can mean either all people or male-only.)

Leute (people)

The German word for 'people' (Leute) only exists in the plural. The words for 'person' (Mensch, Person) can be used when expressing the singular.
