tense vowels (sometimes called "long" vowels) can usually be identified by:
              → an "h" following the vowel: "Ahnung" → "a" followed by "h" is tense
              → a single consonant following the vowel: "loben" → "o" followed by one consonant is tense
              → a doubled spelling of the vowel: "Beet" → "ee" (doubled spelling) indicates a tense vowel
lax vowels (sometimes called "short" vowels) can usually be identified by multiple consonants following the vowel:
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→ "bist" → "i" is lax, indicated by multiple consonants "st" following the vowel

schwa "e" (a super short vowel) occurs:

- → at the end of a word: bitte, danke, habe
- → at the end of a word in the combinations "-el, -en, -er": Gabel, sagen, Messer
- → in the prefixes "ge-" and "be-": benehmen, Besteck, gehabt, Geschirr
