Nani Wale Na Hala

F Nani wale ña hala, eå eå So beautiful are the pandanus C7 Of Naue by the sea. O Naue i ke kai, eă eă F Ka 'oni a'ela, eå eå Moving there C7 F At Ha'ena. Pili mai Hå'ena, eå eå F Ena aku nå maka, eå eå Fiery eyes, C7 Birds upon the flowers. 'O nå manu i ka pua, eå eå F Nani wale ka hahele, eå eå The forest is beautiful C7 Drenched with fragrance. I puia 'ala, eå eå F Ha'ina 'ia mai, eå eå Tell the refrain: C7 The flight of the royal one. 'O Ka-lele-o-üa-lani, eå eå.

This song by J. Ka-hinu honors Ka-lele-o-ña-lani (the flight of the royal ones), a name taken by Queen Emma after the death of her husband, Kamehameha IV in 1863. A year earlier her infant son had died, and her husband had given her the name Ka-lele-o-ña-lani.

Praise of trees, flowers, birds, and places (Naue and Ha'ena on Kauai) was a way of honoring a beloved or important person. The Hono-bays were six Maui bays with names beginning Hono- and ruled by Chief Pi'i-ani.
